Credit to Alexander MacLaren

The bottom line is this: Silas and Mark teach us that success is not measured by what we can do \_\_\_\_\_, but by what we can do \_\_\_\_\_.

## I. SILAS

Acts 15:22 - 40 - Silas is called a "chief man" (KJV) "Leader" (NIV) at the church in Jerusalem.

Acts 16 - In prison with Paul at Philippi, and was with him in Corinth (18:5) Mentioned in I & II Thess 1:1; II Cor. 1:19

A. The importance of supportive work I Cor. 12:22-25 (the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable...)

I Sam. 30:24 – (Message) The share of the one who stays with the gear is the share of the one who fights-equal shares.

B. The importance of \_\_\_\_\_ I Cor. 4:2

II. JOHN MARK Acts 15:37-40

After Acts 15, we don't hear from Mark for about 12 years, then mentioned in connection with Paul's first imprisonment in Rome (Col. 4), where Paul says he was II Tim. 4:11 - "he is helpful to me in my ministry" a comfort to him.

LESSONS:

A. It is possible to overcome past \_\_\_\_\_\_B. There is \_\_\_\_\_\_ in supportive ministry

C. Faithfulness in \_\_\_\_\_\_ things (as WE view smaller/larger) leads to enlarged ministry.
